



To recombine amounts of money from pounds into pence.

Understanding, using and spending money is an important skill to have in life.

Can you think of a time when you would need to use money in real life?

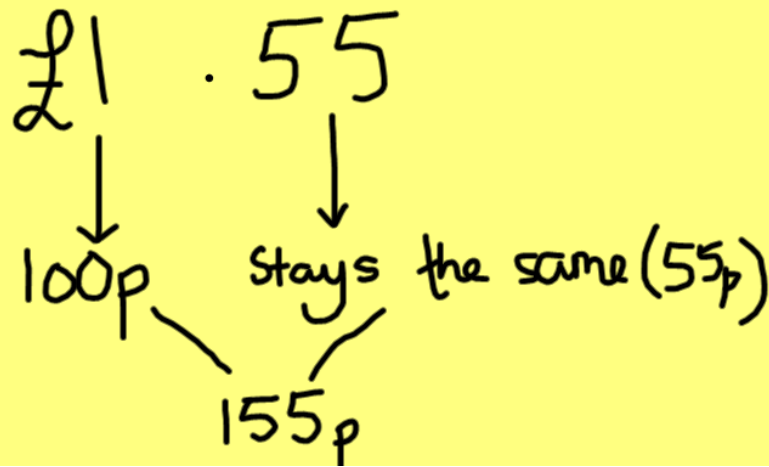


How many pennies are needed to make £1?



How about £2, £4 and £5? What pattern do you notice?

Do not forget your 'pence' when converting money. For example, £1 and 55p becomes 155p.

How many pence is in £2 and 63p?

How many pence is in £5 and 9p?

Remember, in real life £1 and 55p would be represented as **£1.55**. By converting this amount into pence, it will make it easier for us to add other amounts in real life.
